Although state/community colleges play a crucial role in STEM education and workforce development, research on these STEM students is limited. FSCJ's BOSS project addresses this research gap. STEM specific study skill modules were developed and are being utilized in the current term to measure the effect of this intervention on student self-efficacy and success. This presentation will describe the rationale, experimental design, module development and data collection in addition to the demonstration of one of the study skill modules.
